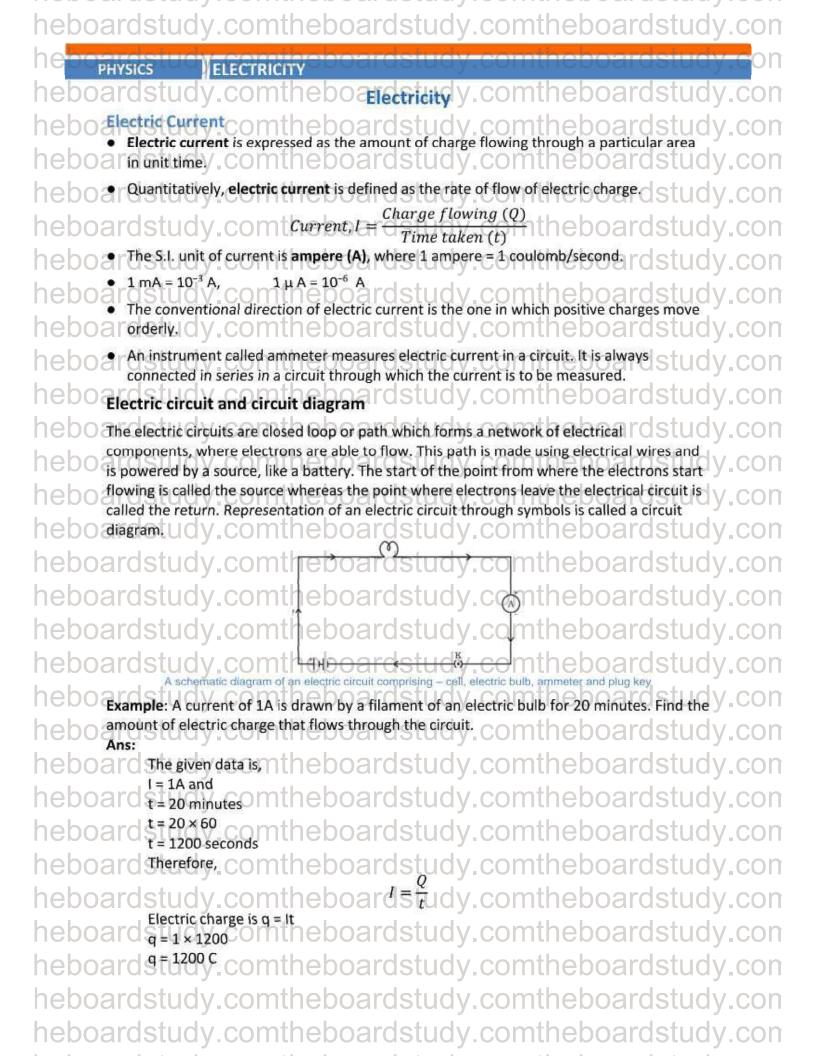
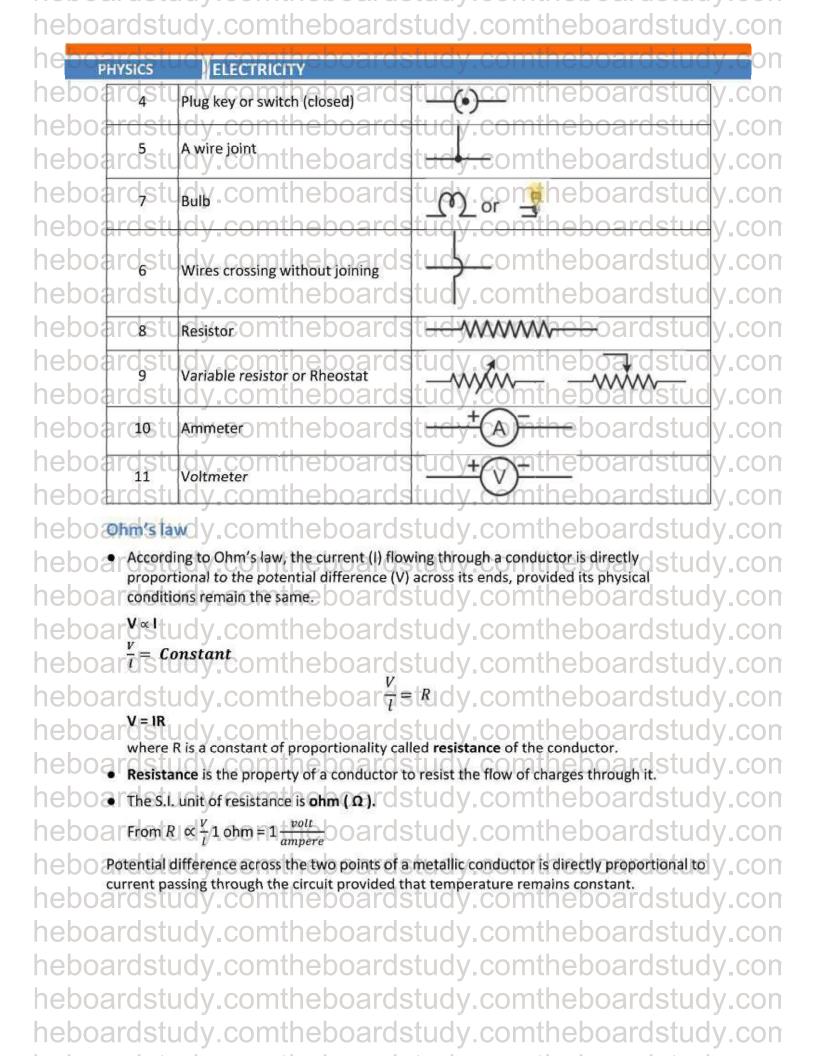
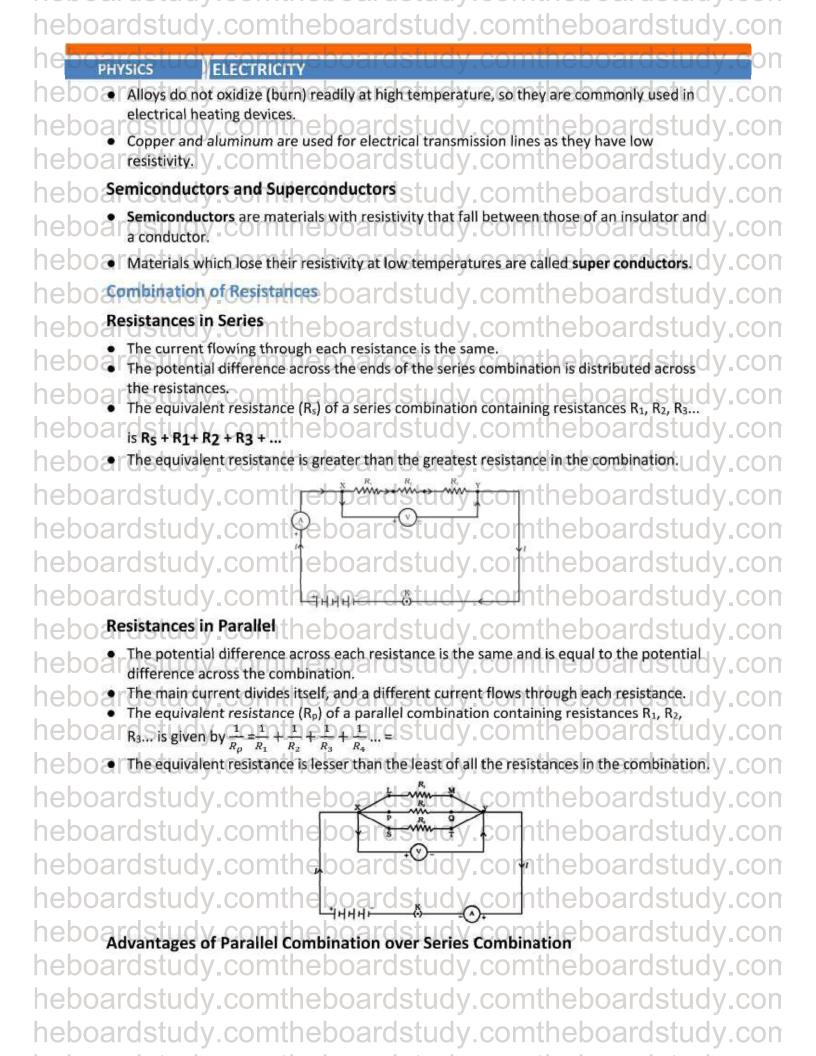

It acts along the line joining the two charges. considered to be point charges. $F \propto rac{q_1q_2}{d^2}$ Electric potential is the work done per unit charge in bringing the charge from infinity to that point against electrostatic force. In a conductor, electrons flow only when there is a difference in electric pressure at its ends. This is also called potential difference **Electric Potential Different** Electric potential difference (pd) between two points in an electric circuit, carrying some current, is the amount of work done to move a unit charge from one point to another. Work done (W) OardStudy Potential difference (pd) = Quanity of charge moved (Q) The S.I. unit of pd is **volt (V)**, where 1 volt = $\frac{1 \ joule}{1 \ coulomb}$ Example: How much work is done in moving a charge of 2 C across two points having potential difference 12 V? 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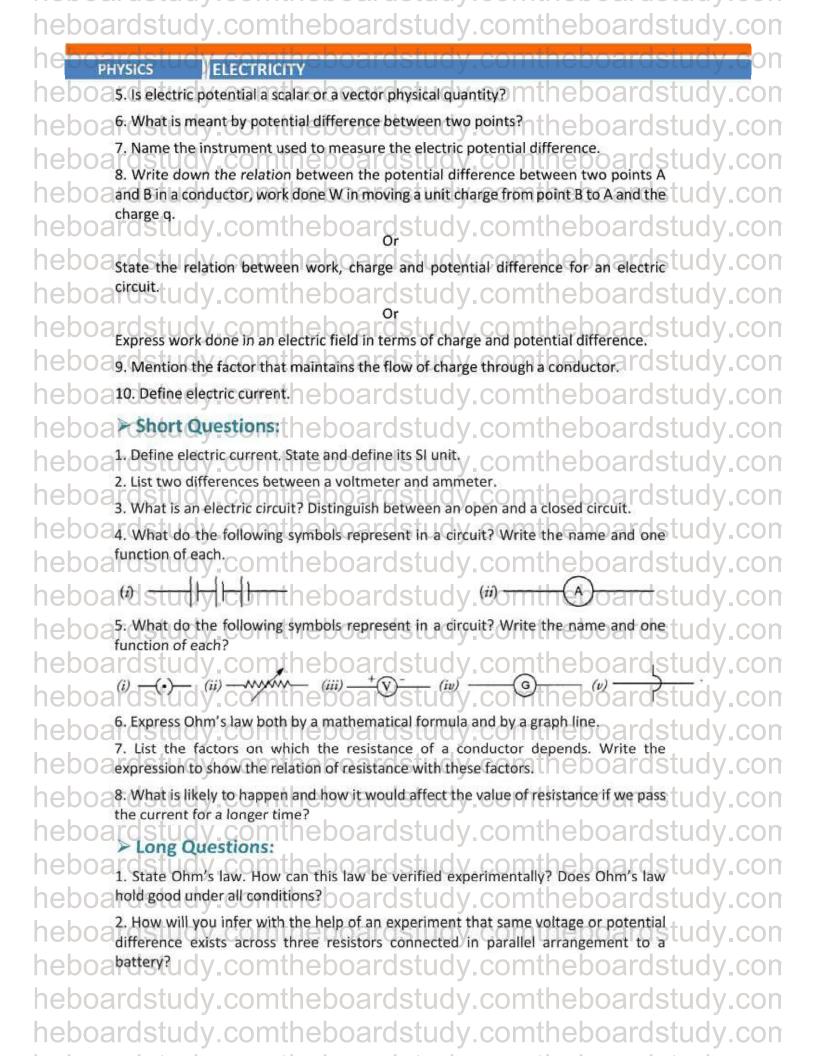
